<p>Write some top tips about life in year three for the current year two children. What do they need to know? Do you have any advice for them?</p> <p>(English)</p>	<p>Write some questions you would like to know about ancient Egypt. You could split them into different categories, e.g., lifestyle, diet, etc. For example, did the ancient Egyptians keep pets?</p> <p>Challenge: Find out the answers to some of your questions!</p> <p>(History – Ancient Egypt)</p>	<p>Explore the link about food groups: What are the five main food groups? - BBC Bitesize</p> <p>Design a balanced meal. Include foods from all five food groups.</p> <p>Challenge: Why is each food group important?</p> <p>(Science – Animals including humans)</p>
<p>Set yourself a realistic budget. Look at a menu or a catalogue, etc. and choose some things you would like to buy. You must stay within your budget!</p> <p>Challenge: With support from a grown up at home, try this in real life!</p> <p>(PSHE – Economic wellbeing)</p>	<p>Shuttle sprint challenge! Set two markers up, a suitable distance apart. Count how many full laps around the markers you can run in one minute. Rest and try again – can you beat your previous score? Can a family member or friend beat you?</p> <p>Challenge: Explain to someone else what you can do to run faster.</p> <p>(PE – Striking and fielding/Athletics)</p>	<p>Do you have any questions about year four? Write these down and we will try our best to answer them!</p> <p>(PSHE – Moving up)</p>

Every half term, your child will receive a homework matrix with activities that are linked to the topics/units of work we are covering in school. We ask that one task is completed per week. Evidence of homework can be glued into children's books, photographs emailed to us, or items can be brought into school. We collect homework books in on a Wednesday morning.

In addition to this, we would also like all children to do the following things weekly:

- Read a minimum of three times to a grown-up/older sibling (please record this in reading records)
- Spend time on TTRockstars/NumBots
- Practise common exception spellings (these are in the back of homework books)

All passwords can be found in children's reading records.
